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
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Attendance

As expected, our 4-day Year 10 extravaganza resulted in a spike in attendance.



Here's a more detailed breakdown, showing trends over the past five conventions:

Our pre-registrations are 1,200+ at this time for CONvergence 2009. That's over two hundred preregistrations ahead of this time last year (1,009 in 2007, 840 in 2006). Does this mean we are going to continue with our growth, or will we see a drop off of At-the-Door registrations? Time will tell...


Demographics

We had 402 Convention Surveys filled out this year. It is always important to remember that any demographic profiles drawn from those surveys reflects the demographic breakdown of those who actually filled out surveys, and is not necessarily a fully accurate depiction of the larger convention membership.


Gender 45.8% Male

We asked our members **"What year did you first attend CONvergence?"** According to the chart below, we've seen a fairly steady influx of new attendees each year since our first year in 1999, with a bit of a spike in those numbers in 2008, no doubt representing the added draw of our Year 10, 4-day extravaganza. 13.7% of those who filled out surveys had attended CONvergence only once (so 2008 was their first), 36.1% had attended between 2-5 times, 25.1% had attended between 6-9 times, and 23.9% had attended all ten.



We asked our members what other conventions they attend. Of those who filled out surveys, 14.7% say they attend Minicon, 19.7% say they attend Marscon, 10.7% say they attend Anime Detour, and 31.1% say they attend no other conventions. Dozens of other conventions were mentioned from across the country in smaller numbers.

Hotel Occupancy

From most perspectives, our occupancy of the Sheraton for our 10th anniversary convention was a huge success. The Sheraton folks are extremely happy with CONvergence and see 2008 as a bright spot in our association. They had as much fun as we did!

We took up good space in the hotel, which also makes everyone happy. Our 2008 occupancy numbers were:

Convention Feedback

"The hotel is getting less friendly"

"Staff & volunteers & hotel were unfailingly polite & cheerful."

- Survey Comments

Different people have wildly different individual experiences. We look through all the feedback we get from Convention Surveys, the At-Con Post Mortem, the Convention Committee Post-Mortem, and other sources and try to find patterns and trends to address.

The following comments represent specific issues we wished to address, as well as questions and comments that seemed to be of general interest.

Art Show

"Could the clearly adult art be in, say, a corner of the art show – not intermixed with the all-ages art?"

- Survey Comment

Please know that we respect the choices of parents, but we do not segregate works that feature nudes, any more than your local art institute or museum does. We also don't believe we'd be able to guess the sensibilities of one art patron vs. another, around what is or is not appropriate for viewing, nor by what age groups. We are very pleased with the quality of work presented, and promise to give patrons a world-class art show. With that as our first goal, we must say "no" to requests like these.

Badging and Volunteering

"It's not necessary to badge inside the rave @ 4:30 A.M., esp. not rudely."

- Survey Comment

The convention does not become an open event simply because it is late at night. The convention pays for the space, pays for the performers, arranges for the equipment to be there – and does all this for the benefit of the paid membership. If you have a badge, wear it visibly (even late at night). If you do not have a badge, you should purchase a membership.

And obviously, we don't want our volunteer badgers to be rude. Most of them do their job well and courteously. If you have an issue with a specific badger, please report it promptly to the Volunteers Table in CONvergence Central so we have the opportunity to address it.

"Let people buy tix/passes for music events. Lots want to come just for the band & DJ's in Space Lounge/Main Stage."

- Survey Comment

We do not want to sell the convention piece-meal and have people pay a smaller amount to attend only a part of the convention. We want a convention that feels like a community, and want to minimize the "convention tourists". The name of the convention is CONvergence, not DIVergence, after all! Pre-registration rates are quite reasonable if you register early.

"Add extra row to top/bottom of grid to plan volunteer hours."

Great idea! Look for it next year!

"21+ badges."

— Survey Comment

The reason our badges are 18+ and not 21+ is that you already have a 21+ identifier: Your state-issued ID. We do not want the convention badge to replace the need for an official ID to be checked when serving alcohol. The state-issued photo ID is more reliable than a convention badge that may or may not be yours. Checking your state-issued ID when serving alcohol is essential for legal liability issues.



Cinema Rex

"Release movie schedule before the con starts (like you do with the panels)"

- Survey Comment

We are unable to announce the full schedules for both the Cinema Rex Movie Room and the Theater Nippon Anime Room prior to the convention due to licensing agreements for many of the films and programs featured.

ConSuite

"Better this year but keep working on improving consuite"

Thanks! We will.

"Bring in some rented ice machines."

- Survey Comment

That's an interesting idea. We're going to look into that!

CVG-TV

"I loved seeing MainStage events on the hotel TV- please keep doing it!"

We plan to! This was our first year broadcasting MainStage events and footage from past year's conventions on the hotel television. We've branded these broadcasts as CVG-TV. We hope to offer more new and archival programming in 2009.

Dealers Room

"Longer dealers room hours."

— Survey Comment

We're investigating the possibilities of varying Dealers Room hours next year, and we will be talking to dealers to see what can work best for both them and CONvergence members.

Hotel & Facilities

"Re: Recycling – Yay!"

— Survey Comment

Spearheaded by dedicated volunteers, we collected more than 15 bags of recycled cans, which were in turn donated to a local, non-profit bicycle group. In fact that group did the pick-up from the Sheraton for us.

As it was our first, focused attempt, we focused solely on can recycling. We want to be certain our systems are in place and functioning smoothly before we expand the program to include bottles. Connie extends her thanks to the volunteers who gave their time to help ensure a successful launch.

"Put _____ in a bigger space"

— Distilled from SEVERAL Survey Comments

We have a finite amount of space at the Sheraton Bloomington Hotel, and try to place events and features of the convention in the best space available depending on the anticipated popularity and specific needs of those events. When and if the Sheraton decides to build an additional wing of function space for the hotel, we'll eagerly look to expand into that space. However, there do not seem to be any such plans on the horizon...

"[Put a] Map on website of alternative parking locations, if that happens again."

Great idea. As overflow parking becomes more of a necessity, we're looking for additional ways to best accommodate our members' needs.

"To save the sanity of the sleeping airport staff, see if you can coordinate with the hotel to put them on the 20th floor instead of just below gaming."

Programming

"I would like to see more academic panels"

"More science presentations."

"2 panels on young adult literature – one for new books, one older books"

"Even more Dr. Who. Yes even more."

"More comics/writing panels"

Our programming schedule is set up based on what the convention membership would like to see and what the membership is interested in running. If you've got a programming idea for 2009, especially if you can help us put it together, contact the programming department at programming@convergence-con.org, or attend the **Programming Brainstorming** session on **November 15, 2008** at 2:00pm at the Sheraton Bloomington Hotel.

We try to balance the wide variety of interests of our membership as well, so we want a large variety of subjects and not duplicate things too many times. In general, if we're going to have multiple panels on similar topics, each panel needs to be different.

"Panels at odd hours. Like 1:30am Saturday. We can run them!"

"I loved the late night programming. LOVED it! Did I mention the late night panels?

That I LOVED them?! Not all of us want crowded parties.

It was great to have something of substance to DO after 7pm"

We like late night panels as well and plan to continue to have them. If you've got an idea that you think that would be good for late night and are willing to run it, we'd certainly consider it. Contact programming!

"ASL interpreting – please keep!"

American Sign Language interpretation for select panels and events was new this year. Our thanks go out to our volunteer interpreters for making it such a great success. A number of Deaf and hearing impaired members of the convention expressed their appreciation for being able to enjoy aspects of the convention for the first time! We plan to offer select ASL interpretation next year and hope make the system work even better.

General

"Make Connie's pupils on the big cutout more visible.

One unexpected feature of the giant Connie's flanking MainStage (they've been called the "Connie Argonath") is that as the MainStage lighting rotated through a variety of color schemes, Connie's rectangular pupils would disappear against the background color of her eyes, making them look eerily blank. We'll see if there's a way to fix this odd feature...

"Let the restaurants in the area know the event is happening."

We *try* to. There was some miscommunication this year. In putting the annual restaurant guide together, we try to reach all the area restaurants to verify their hours for the weekend, and make them aware of the convention. That does not mean that those holiday hours might not change at the last minute, or that the representative from the restaurant we speak to communicates to their staff about the large convention coming their way.

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When we decided to make CONvergence 2008 four days long to celebrate our tenth year, we never imagined that we wouldn't return to a 3-day convention in 2009. But after a great deal of positive experiences at the convention and soliciting feedback from ever-widening circles over recent months, the decision has been made to make the move to four days a *permanent* one.

We know that this decision instantly raises many questions and concerns, so we'd like to address a number of them here. We think the benefits and opportunities of a 4-day structure will serve the convention better in the future, and that the majority of the potential downsides of a 4-day convention can be mitigated or negated altogether with careful planning in the coming months.

So without further ado, may we present the 4-Day FAQ!

Q: Why do you want to go to Four Days?

A: The reaction to our 4-day convention was so positive, not just among attendees but also our convention staff, that we decided to investigate the advantages of moving to a 4-day model permanently. As CONvergence has grown, we have found that it is impossible for us to expand in space (the hotel ain't gettin' any bigger), but we can expand in time. In fact, conversations with other 4-day conventions gave us some interesting perspective. As one convention chair said (to paraphrase), "Once you pass 3.000 attendees, your choices are four days or death."

Q: How would a 4-day CONvergence 2009 be different than 2008?

A: There will be many differences between our 4-day 2008 convention and any ongoing 4-day model. We plan to make adjustments to Programming Schedules and hours for many of the CONvergence venues and events to optimize them for a 4-day convention. We're looking at ideas from Dealers, Volunteers, Party Organizers and Convention Committee members to make a 4-day convention successful and enjoyable for everyone.

Q: I've already registered for a 3-day con. What do I do?

A. Nothing. Your registration is now for a 4-day con.

Going forward, our Registration Rates will be the same as they were in 2008, plus an extra \$5 at the door to make our At-the-Door rate **\$70**. This was NOT done out of necessity to cover the cost of the extra day, but rather is an attempt to drive more people to pre-register. The number of At-the-Door registrations have been skyrocketing in recent years with nearly a thousand in 2008. As the convention gets larger it is more and more critical for us to be able to plan for our membership size, which is increasingly difficult with higher numbers of At-the-Door registrations.

With that said, we wanted to make the transition to a 4-day model as easy for our membership as possible, so we will honor the \$35 Pre-registration rate announced at the con until **December 31**, even though this was for the expected

3-day convention. On January 1 the rate goes to **\$50** until pre-registration ends on **May 15**. And the At-the-Door rate is **\$70**. Again, if you have ALREADY pre-registered for CONvergence 2009, you don't need to do *ANYTHING*. Your registration is now for a 4-day con.

Q: I've already requested a hotel room - what do I do?

A: Don't worry - we'll be doing all the work. Our fabulous hotel team will be contacting each and every person who has turned in a hotel room reservation form and asking them if and how they want to change their room reservation. In essence, if you've already sent in a form, you'll be contacted by us so that we can ask, "Hey, did you want your room for Thursday night too?" And if you don't want the extra night, there will be *no penalty*.

Q: Will it affect how room reservations are handled?

A: *No.* Rooms are always assigned, as much as is possible, on a first-come, first-served basis. Of course we are dealing with finite resources and a large demand—often it is not possible to meet every exact need. But a person requesting a room early gets what they want, whether for a 3-day convention or a 4-day convention (meaning that even if you only want two nights of a 4-day convention, as long as the rooms are available, your request will be honored).

Of course, the Sheraton and the CONvergence hotel department *do* reserve the right to make last minute changes as needs dictate. But the process will still remain the same.

The following questions can also be found in our FAQ on the website:

- Q: Are there other changes to hotel room assignments or reservations as a result of the 4-day convention?
- Q: Will a 4-day convention be more expensive to CONvergence in hotel charges?
- Q: I can't afford 4 days!
- Q: What about the room parties?
- Q: What about the Dealers?
- Q: Why rush to make this change for 2009?
- Q: Why not alternate?
- Q: Can CONvergence/MISFITS afford it?
- Q: Won't it be more work? Will people burn out?
- Q: So does this mean there'll be 25 Guests roaming around every year?
- Q: What if it doesn't work?

His fourth published novel, <code>MythOS</code> is expected to be available in the summer of 2009. Some of his 20 published short stories include <code>The Uncola</code> and <code>When Jabberwocks Attack</code>. He also has written a number of poems, including <code>The Bees: An Edgar Allan Pooh Poem</code>. His non-fiction work includes the <code>Interactions</code> in <code>Physical Science Curriculum</code>, an illustrated collection that is part of a robust middle school physical science curriculum and was fundedby the National Science Foundation and has been adopted by several state boards of education.

Before succeeding as a published author, Kelly acted in the Minnesota Renaissance Festival, the Colorado Renaissance Festival, and the Arizona Renaissance Festival. He lives with his wife, Laura, and a number of cats in Menomonie, Wisconsin. Kelly is a winner of the 2000 "Writers of the Future" award, an international competition begun by L. Ron Hubbard.

Patrick Rothfuss describes himself as having had "the good fortune to be born in Wisconsin where long winters and lack of cable television brought about a love of reading and writing."

Matt introduced Patrick in contact with his current, beloved editor, Betsy Wollheim, president of Daw Books, where Patrick would publish his novel *The Name of the Wind*.


