





We are pleased to state that CONvergence 2006 was our best-attended convention to date, with our registration totals continuing to go up each year.

Of the 307 people who filled out convention surveys this year (50 more than last year), 52% were male and 48% were female. This is the first year going back to 2002 that more males than females filled out surveys. These numbers fluctuate from year to year, and do not necessarily indicate a trend.


Favorite Features.

Sheraton Bloomington Hotel Occupancy

Once again, and certainly not to be taken for granted, we had a successful stay at the Sheraton Bloomington Hotel for CONvergence 2006. We nearly filled the building with 512 rooms occupied on Friday and 530 on Saturday. While this year the hotel held 20 rooms for their own use, we are told that next year the whole building will be allocated to CONvergence.


There were no attendee-related issues this year. The elevators did go out on Friday, but that was a fault in the building's fire system. And yes, there was a fire alarm that went off Friday night, but it proved to be a false alarm, and as in 2005, CONvergence attendees rose to the occasion and responded in an appropriate and orderly manner. COnvention Feedback

Every year we get a great deal of feedback on the convention in the Convention Surveys as well as at the At-Con Post Mortem and through other channels. We'd like to take this opportunity to respond to some of those comments here, department by department.

ConSuite

"No soup in consuite—it is too messy, unsanitary.

More snacks. Don't try to feed meals to us."

"More S\$ for consuite-bring back eternal soup!"

"Less candy & pop in the consuites. Healthier food."

"The real food at consuite was awesome!!!"

- Survey Comment

As usual, the comments on ConSuite indicate that we can't please all the people all the time. With a new staff this year and a new method of food delivery, we did notice some confusion.

This year ConSuite moved to a method of "stations" for food delivery. If you wanted chips, you would find them at the chips station. Candy was at the candy station. Side rooms were saved for special "wow" foods. Did we include any sort of maps or descriptions of what we were trying to do? Nope. Big mistake. We have already begun work on that problem for next year.

It has never been our policy to serve meals to the entire convention. We don't have a budget that will allow for that. We do try to have a good variety available at various times throughout the weekend. This is just a sample of the items that were available throughout the weekend:

- Ramen noodles (available at all times)
- Rice (available as fast as we could make it)
- Leeann Chin appetizers

- Three sandwich bars
- Fresh Fruit (available at all times)
- Davanni's Pizza

We have a lot of great ideas for special foods for next year. Look for an update in PR2 for information on the ConSuite layout and foods.

MainStage

"This year the masquerade dance was too loud. Louder than the years before."

"The music at the dance needs to be a bit quieter - it's too loud & we didn't last more than 5 minutes there."

It is a fairly universal sentiment that the main stage volume was too high. We are going to make sure to do something about that issue for next year.

"More seating in Cinema Rex & Main Stage"

- Survey Comment

Unfortunately, we are limited by the physical layout of the hotel and fire codes. MainStage is already in our single largest space and it cannot be made any larger. We have tried to mitigate that situation by adding a video feed with additional seating for Masquerade but we will never be able to seat everyone who wants to go. We are looking into the possibility of video feed to the hotel cable system but that has proven to be a very expensive option. For now, we can only recommend you arrive early if you want a seat at main stage events.

Masquerade

"Masquerade needs more volunteers. Masq head was great! She just needs a bigger staff."

- Survey Comment

You said it. Masquerade was dangerously short of volunteer help this year. It is one department that is in desperate need of support staff. Here's hoping that a few people reading this will answer the call.

"Masquerade was not up to the usual standard. Better MC would have helped. Participants were good, pacing was bad."

- Survey Comment

As part of our overall staffing problem, we lost our Masquerade emcee at the last moment. Eve Kramer stepped in to a difficult position at the eleventh hour and under the circumstances did a fantastic job. We truly appreciate her efforts to take over a very challenging task with virtually no preparation.

Programming

"Move GoH events to larger venues. I arrived a few minutes late to Eric Flint and/or David Weber events and there wasn't even standing room available at the Dorian Gray and Kruschenko rooms."

- Survey Comment

While Kruschenko's and the Dorian Gray Literary lounge are smaller spaces, our Guests consistently ask to be scheduled in those rooms because they enjoy the more intimate environment. We understand that those rooms fill up quickly and we make certain that our guests are not exclusively scheduled in smaller rooms. As long as our guests enjoy the more intimate venues for panels, however, we will continue to utilize them.

That is entirely on purpose. By counter-programming, we can spread out the convention attendees to several panel rooms rather than having them concentrated in a single location. We recognize that sometimes requires difficult choices but we would rather give our convention membership too many choices rather than not enough.

The Programming Guide is finalized and printed as late as possible (usually delivered to the convention Thursday morning) so it can be as current as possible with last-minute changes to the schedule. Mailing would mean that it would be awaiting you at home when you returned from the convention. Much of the schedule is available on our website prior to the convention weekend.

Registration

Registration enjoyed its new location across from the Navigator Bar (especially during the soccer match). Between the location change and new department heads we had some learning curve issues but things seemed to go well overall.

Attendees seemed to like our innovations for 2006 - membership packs and pre-printed 2007 Registration Forms were especially popular. We're continuing to improve our database and registration proceedures, and hope that you'll like our 2007 Registration model even more.

Silent Auction

The Silent Auction made over \$2,000 this year for the educational programs that MISFITS funds. We could not have gotten such a total without the help of many donators from within the MIS-06

FITS community. Special thanks to Chris Colquhoun, Christine Sutherland, Eric Flint and Vincent Truitner for helping to make the 2006 Silent Auction such a success. Some of the best sellers this year were a replica of Mal's gun from *Serenity* which sold for \$350, a Baens Universe-Andromeda Club online Subscription \$150, a custom made Browncoat from The DreamStitcher for \$100, and a signed photo of Gigi Edgely as Chianna which went for \$60.



While those ghouls and goblins will certainly be part of the proceedings, creature characters are not limited to the realm of Horror. They are the inhabitants of the world of *The Dark Crystal*. They help populate Middle Earth. Some drown their sorrows in the canteena at Mos Eisley. Others lurk on alien worlds awaiting visits from the crew of the USS Enterprise or the Jupiter II. Some of them found work on the crew of Moya. One of them IS Moya.

They are the non-human characters that we love or sometimes love to hate in science fiction and fantasy as well as horror. Heck, *Sigmund the Sea Monster* qualifies. The creatures are legion, and they're coming to CONvergence 2007.



2007 Guests of Honor

The following guests currently plan to join us at CONvergence 2007 as guests of honor. Watch our website for the latest updates to this list.

Lois McMaster Bujold

Lois is a Hugo and Nebula Award winning author of science fiction and fantasy, having won four Hugos in the Novel category, more than any other writer except for Robert A. Heinlein. She is best known for her series of novels featuring Miles Vorkosigan, a disabled interstellar spy and mercenary admiral from planet Barrayar, a thousand years in our future. The Vorkosigan Series incorporates a variety of genres, from space opera, to detective and even high-society romance.

Lois McMaster Bujold was born in Columbus, Ohio, and began reading adult science fiction at age nine, a taste she attributes to the influence of her father, engineer Robert Charles McMaster. "He was a professor of Welding Engineering at Ohio State and an old Cal Tech man," says Lois, "and used to buy the science fiction magazines and paperback books to read on the plane on consulting trips; these naturally fell to me. My reading tastes later expanded to include history, mysteries, romance, travel, war, poetry, etc."


Lois won Nebula awards for *Falling Free* (1988), and for her novella *The Mountains of Mourning* (1989) she won both the Nebula and Hugo. Her other Hugo wins include The Vor Game (1990), *Barrayar* (1991), *Mirror Dance* (1994), and *Paladin of Souls* (2003).

Her fantasy novel *The Curse of Chalion* (2001) won the Mythopoeic Award for Adult Literature and was nominated for the 2002 World Fantasy Award for best novel. Her fourth Hugo was for *Paladin of Souls*, a sequel to *The Curse of Chalion*. A third book in the world of Chalion, *The Hallowed Hunt*, was published by Eos in June of 2005.

Lois has also edited several anthologies, starting with Women at War which she produced with Roland Green for Tor Books in 1995.

12-year-old Emily Hagins was the writer/director/producer/editor of the low-budget zombie film **Pathogen**. CONvergence is pleased to welcome the now 14-yearold Emily Hagins as our youngest-ever Guest of Honor.

Emily was born in Philadelphia, PA and moved to Austin, TX when she was 8 months old. Since the age of about 7, she has enjoyed seeing movies multiple times in the theaters and earned the nickname in second grade of "The movie girl". At


age 9 she saw *The Lord of the Rings: The Fellowship of the Ring* and was inspired to make her own movie. Working with a camcorder, Emily made several shorts starting in the third grade, including one featuring a Care Bear assassin who targeted Barbie dolls.

In fourth grade Emily saw her very first zombie movie, the New Zealand Horror/Comedy *Undead*. "I used to be scared of horror movies until then," she says. "I realized that horror movies could also be funny. I decided that I wanted to make a feature film and it was going to be a zombie movie." By the end of May 2004, Emily had finished the screenplay and was ready to start filming. Not only did she write the screenplay and direct the film, she did the camera work, co-produced, edited the film.

The filmmaker and her mother are careful not to overhype the end result. No one should go in expecting a polished feature, they insist; for outsiders, the impressive thing is simply that a filmmaker so young and with limited resources tackled such a project and saw it through.

Meanwhile, Emily is enthused about getting behind the camera again. More cannibalism and viral mutations, one wonders? "I definitely want to make other kinds of films," she insists. The only genre that doesn't appeal to her, she says, is the "chick flick."

Bernie Wrightson

Legendary artist Bernie Wrightson has been creating creature artwork for over thirty years. Best known for co-creating the comic book character Swamp Thing, and for definitively illustrating *Mary Shelley's Frankenstein*, which the artist considers among his most personal works. Bernie also collaborates regularly with author Stephen King.

Bernie began working in comics at DC Comics in 1968, providing many stories for DC's *House of Mystery* and *House of Secrets* anthology titles, before co-creating *Swamp Thing* (with CONvergence 2006 Guest of Honor Len Wein), which he went on to illustrate in his own title.

By 1974. Bernie had left DC to work at Warren Publishing, for whose black-and-white horror-comics magazines he produced a series of original work as well as adaptations of stories by H. P. Lovecraft and Edgar Allan Poe.

In 1975, Wrightson joined with fellow artists Jeff Jones, Michael Kaluta, and Barry Windsor-Smith to form "The Studio," a shared loft in Manhattan where the group would pursue creative products outside the constraints of comic book commercialism. Though he continued to produce sequential art, Wrightson at this time began producing artwork for numerous posters, prints, calendars, and even coloring books.

Bernie wrote and drew the sci-fi mini-series Captain Sternn, which was the basis for one of the segments of the cult-favorite Heavy Metal movie. Bernie also drew the poster for the Stephen King-penned horror film Creepshow, as well as illustrating the comic book adaptation of the film. This led to several other collaborations with King, including illustrations for the novella Cycle of the Werewolf and the restored edition of King's apocalyptic horror epic, The Stand.

As a conceptual artist, Bernie's worked on many movies, particularly in the horror genre: well-known films include *Ghostbusters, The Faculty, Galaxy Quest, Spider-man*, and George Romero's *Land of the Dead*. Recently, Bernie did production design on the Reavers for the 2005 film *Serenity*.

Today, Bernie resides in Los Angeles with his wife Liz, where he works both on film designs and his own pet projects, including comic books, character designs for animation, and creepy drawings just for fun!

2007 Hotel Reservations






