


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WELCOME TO CONVERGENCE 2006

In MEMORIUM

MICHAEL SHEARD, CONVERGENCE GUEST OF HONOR IN BOTH 2001 AND 2003 DIED IN AUGUST OF 2005 AT THE AGE OF 65.

TV and film fans know Michael best for his roles as Mr. Bronson on the long running Grange Hill series, for his appearances on Dr. Who, and for his roles as Admiral Ozzel in The Empire Strikes Back and Adolf Hitler in Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade.

CONvergence members will remember Michael for his charm, his infectious energy, his love of scotch, and his love of fandom. Michael enjoyed his first year at CONvergence in 2001 so much that he called for CONvergence to become a five day convention at the Closing Ceremony on Sunday. The chant of "Five Days" has become a recurring joke of the convention.

Another memorable Michael Sheard moment resulted from Michael's countless stories of his goodnatured distain for "that f-ing dog" (the infamously difficult to work with Doctor Who companion K-9). A mock-up of K-9 was secretly prepared to be offered up to Michael at the 2003 Closing Ceremony for him to destroy with a cricket bat. Before the mock-up K-9 had been revealed, Michael was asked to share with the Closing Ceremony audience his thoughts on the robotic dog, to which Michael responded "If he were here right now, I would jump up and down on him." You can't ask for a better cue than that. Out came K-9, and Michael did indeed stomp K-9 to bits. K-9's head currently resides in the CONvergence 2003 Time Capsule.

So raise a glass for Michael Sheard. We'll do it together at CONvergence 2006.

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OPERATIONS POLICIES

THE FUNCTION OF OPERATIONS IS THREE FOLD:

- Communications
- Information Accumulation and Dispersal
- Problem Resolution


Operations is the main communications center and point of contact for individual departments of the convention to interact with each other, and for attendees of the convention to interact with the Convention Committee.

The Operations Bridge

"The Bridge" is open 24 hours a day during the convention and is located in Verandas 1 & 2. You can reach the Operations Bridge from any hotel phone at extension x7215.

Wandering Hosts

In addition to The Bridge, Operations extends its presence out into the convention in the form of Wandering Hosts, who are available to answer questions, give directions, and help to resolve problems. If a Wandering Host does not know the answer to your question, they can help you find someone who does.



Here are some of the key CONvergence policies you should be aware of during the convention weekend. If you have any questions or concerns, please visit the Operations Bridge.

1. Animal Policy

Sentient beings only. The exception is working animals like guide dogs/seeing eye dogs. Please do not bring your animals to the convention. If you do, you will be asked to leave, without refund.

2. Adhesive Posts (Stickers) Policy

Neither the convention hotel nor CONvergence will tolerate the application of stickers or high-tack tape to hotel surfaces. Their removal is damaging to the hotel, and therefore considered unacceptable. Incidents of this kind will be treated as vandalism.

You may post non-adhesive signs with masking tape **only**, on walls and surfaces that won't be damaged by removal, such as tile and metal. If you don't have acceptable tape, come to The Bridge. We're happy to share ours.

3. Badge Policy

Your convention badge is necessary for your participation in the convention. It allows you access to the convention and indicates that you are a member in good standing. However, CONvergence reserves the right to revoke the membership of any member who breaks our house rules, or behaves in such a manner as is deemed unsafe or unacceptable.

4. City, County, State and Federal Laws

Please remember - whatever applies outside, still applies inside the hotel and the convention.

5. Litter

Please pick up after yourself. There are trash containers around the hotel. It makes a big difference if we try to keep things clean.

6. Smoking

As of March of 2005 the entire hotel is now nonsmoking with one exception. The only place that smoking is allowed is *inside the sleeping rooms*. This includes the consuite and cabanas. Smoking on the patios and balconies is not allowed. You can smoke only **inside** the room.

7. Weapons Policy


We want everyone to have a safe and enjoyable time while at CONvergence, so please leave your weapons in your quarters. Otherwise, please adhere to the following policy, or risk being 'uninvited' to the convention, without refund from the convention or the hotel.

- a) Firearms are not allowed, nor are working projectile weapons. If a guest is found with a weapon, we will request that they take it off the premises and escort them to the door. Just taking it to the guest's room or putting it in the Hotel Safe is not acceptable.
- Bladed weapons must be sheathed and peace-bonded and cannot be drawn under any circumstances.
- Realistic looking firearms must be holstered and peacebonded and cannot be drawn under any circumstances.
 If they cannot be peace-bonded, they are not allowed.
- d) Non-realistic looking firearms must be holstered and peace-bonded if possible.
- e) Non-realistic looking firearms that cannot be holstered cannot be pointed at any other member of the convention under any circumstances. These weapons must be marked.
- f) Any costume that contains realistic looking firearms and gives the appearance of a member of law enforcement or the military will not be permitted as the potential is too great to create confusion for other members of the convention.
- g) Costumes such as those listed in (f) or accompanied by weaponry that would not be permitted under the other rules may be worn when the wearer is participating in

- a convention function or programming item such as the Masquerade or other programming item. They may be worn only for the duration of the function.
- h) Non-realistic looking firearms that cannot be holstered under rule (e) will have peace-bonding material tied to the weapon as a visible sign that it's been checked out and approved by the Exec or one of the Heads of Operations. We will have marking material available on The Bridge for those who need it.
- The CONvergence Board of Directors reserves the right to amend these policies without prior notice. Any ruling made by the Board of Directors is final,

8. Clarifications

- a) Projectile weapons If it projects a solid, liquid, gas or energy, it is considered a working projectile weapon. Laser-light pistols emit a beam that can be damaging to the corneas. Under this policy, it is a working projectile weapon. Water pistols are allowed only if they are empty and must be holstered and peace-bonded or marked according to rules (c), (d) and (e). Tasers and other stun guns are considered projectile weapons.
- b) Peace-bonding A peace-bonded weapon is one tied to its sheath, holster or container with a functional, decorative binding. It prevents someone else from taking your weapon without permission. It is a traditional and visible sign to everyone that you are a responsible person. We will have peace-bonding material on The Bridge for those who need it.

•Milkbar – Formed in Spring 2005 by bassist Spike, Milkbar has since grown into a formidable five-member project. With an Electropunk sound reminiscent of Garbage or Curve, Milkbar creates music based on hot rhythms and electro beats. Then they add some rock'n'roll, a bunch of notes, and infuse it with pop.

• Signal & Report - Signal & Report make music for the 3:00am hour, full of mystery, doubt, fear and cold sweat. Although sometimes dark, their music never broods-this is no navelgazing melancholia. Instead of vague adolescent notions of pain or alienation, the songs trade in themes of a larger scope with a more literary bent. Live, the group has a compelling intensity that challenges its audience rather than condescending to patronize them. A mix of ringing guitar and sighing synths soar over pulsing rhythms of rolling tom toms and slippery basslines, creating a towering sound of depth and dynamic tension. Amongst all of it is a deep and resonant voice communicating a range of anxiety, terror, and empathy with equal parts croak and croon.

Signal & Report was formed in Minneapolis in 2000 by Chris Hall (guitar/vocals), Noah Miller (bass/vocals), Christian Herro (keyboards), and Mike Cain (drums/saxophone). After recording Marchlands, Miller left for New York in late '03 to do design work (he has done all of the group's album artwork). Mark Pakulski, from the Psychedelicates, took over on bass, and the group has been writing material for the forthcoming EP, The Sound of Hope, and an eventual third album. www.signalandreport.com

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

ERIC FLINT J.G. HERTZLER I





TO ME, THE MOST IMPORTANT ASPECT of a story isn't the plot. There is far more satisfaction in a weak plot with characters that you love like a friend or hate like your own worst enemy than in a well-crafted plot with wooden characters. True joy is when you find that rare juxtaposition of plot and character that leaves you near tears just because you finished the book and you aren't sure when you'll get to read the next one in the series. Or when it's 3am and you run to grab the next book because you can't stop reading.

When I first started noticing Eric Flint's name, it was alongside others like David Weber, Mercedes Lackey, and David Drake. Perusing my favorite aisle at the bookstore, his name popped up often. That piqued my curiosity. If he's writing alongside people like that, he must write his own books, too, right? And sure enough, there he was!

Picking up an Eric Flint novel is often like handling a little piece of skewed history. His stories are imaginative, but have a realism that really makes you believe in the tale. Characters become people that you know personally, some of them making you feel altruistic or murderous. I have long appreciated his philosophical and historical takes, but I never really knew why until I found out that I would be his liaison. Research ensued and the more information that came to light, the more it all made sense.

Eric has a master's degree in history, specializing in West Africa. The only reason he doesn't have a doctorate is that his socialist political views became more important to him. He was published in the *Journal of African History* in 1970, and perhaps that is where he got the real bite to write, despite it being more than 20 years before he got truly down-and-dirty serious about it.

During the interim, he was a longshoreman, a laborer, and a machinist at various times. But being a person who never seems to have too much on his plate, his interest in politics led him to become a labor organizer. This had the happy side effect of introducing him to his wife, Lucille.

Now that he is a serious (note I didn't say full-time) writer, Eric juggles so many balls that I have no idea how he finds time to sleep, much less write more novels. His views on internet downloading led him to found the Baen Free Library, where he's proven quite soundly that freebies lead to buying. Although, when you have a product as addictive as good sci-fi/ fantasy, the conclusion is practically foregone. The proof is in the fact that Baen has not only continued with the Library, but also started offering subscriptions to bundled works on a monthly basis... oh, and the fact that the books are selling better than

Besides that, research, collaborating with other authors, keeping up to date with Baen's Bar forums, editing and repackaging classic SF authors' works, and organizing the self-funding eMagazine Grantville Gazette keep Eric occupied in those moments when he isn't writing.

As a CONvergence Guest of Honor in 2003, he gave generously of his time, talking for hours with many attendees. It must be refreshing for him to mingle with fans. I hope our convention allows him some relaxation along with a few days off from the whirlwind.

Heather Wuori is a CONvergence volunteer, and is the Guest Uaison for Eric Flint. BORN INTO A FAMILY WHOSE roots go back eight generations in the small Pennsylvania town of Port Royal, J.G. Hertzler was raised on various foreign and domestic Air Force bases, from El Paso to Casablanca.

Before turning to theatre as a profession, J.G. played outside linebacker at Bucknell University. After college, he worked in the Nixon Administration in an office that was created by the National Environmental Protection Act within GSA. He was deeply involved in environmental affairs in college and has remained so for the last 30-plus years. Currently, he is a strong proponent of bio-mass fuels to eliminate continued dependence on importation of foreign oil, and thereby reduce US involvement in Middle Eastern wars.


In television, some of his bestknown work was the Klingon General Martok on Star Trek: Deep Space Nine. He also appeared in Voyager and Enterprise. Other television credits include Seinfeld, Roswell, Six Feet Under, Touched by an Angel, Charmed, Dr. Quinn, Diagnosis Murder, Quantum Leap, The Highlander, Fortune Hunter, Brisco County Jr., Lois and Clark, General Hospital, One Life to Live, Movin' On, Partners in Crime, Ultraman, and over 50 episodes on the New Zorro series as Alcalde Ignacio DeSoto. In the Fall of 1997, he was featured with Jennifer Beals and Christopher Walken in the film Prophecy 2. A co-star in many movies of the week, J.G. can be seen sword fighting his way through Anthony Zerbe in Treasure Island, and most recently appearing as Ridley Scott in the Pirates Of Silicon Valley. He has appeared with Al Pacino in the Barry Levinson/Norman Jewison classic film, ... And Justice For All.

In theatre, Mr. Hertzler was recently seen playing opposite

Academy Award winning actress Holly Hunter in a new Irish play, By the Bog of Cats, for San Jose Repertory Theatre. On Broadway, he appeared opposite Irene Pappas in the controversial production of the classic The Bacchae, directed by Michael Coccyannis. He had the distinct honor of performing with Oscar-winning actor Roddy MacDowall in the 1996 national tour of Dial M For Murder. Other theatre credits include leading roles with the finest regional theatres in the U.S., including the title roles of Richard II and The Admirable Crichton for ACT in San Francisco, appearances at The Guthrie, The Folger Theatre, Arena Stage, The Kennedy Center, Cincinnati Playhouse, San Jose Repertory Theatre, and St. Louis Rep., among many others.

As a stage director, Mr. Hertzler has staged works for The Guthrie, ACT, Off-Broadway in New York City, The New Playwrights' Theatre of Washington, The Camden Shakespeare Festival, and several productions in the LA area including the much acclaimed American premier of Australian Kenneth Ross's award-winning play, Breaker Morant.

Having completed post-graduate work at UCLA in Screenwriting, Mr. Hertzler has optioned three of his scripts, *Prometheus*, *Dancing With Sancho Panza*, and *French Toast*. In 2003, his two-part novel, *Left Hand Of Destiny*, based on his character Martok of *Deep Space 9*, was published by Simon and Schuster.

Ken's been working in the gaming industry about as long as I have - ten years, to be more or less precise. Ken's usually more precise; I, less so.

Ken is the world's Phone-A-Friend, a font of knowledge both trivial and crucial, arcane and mundane, surprising and gob-smacking.

His gaming credits read like a "who's who" of some of the industry's most important and critically acclaimed tomes: dare I mention the likes of Nephilm (he authored "Secret Societies" for the system), or GURPS Alternate Earths? And these were the books that started his career.

His regular columns in *Pyramid Magazine* ("Suppressed Transmissions") and *www.gamingreport.com* ("Out of the Box") are much-loved must-reads on a biweekly basis for thousands of gamers. Whether constructing elaborate links between, say, the Bavarian Illuminati and Corn Pops, or simply coming up with another sparkling overview of recent releases, his prose is seldom less than addictive. Many writers have a way with words; Ken has a way, means and motive. He also knows where the body was dumped.

Calling Ken the high priest of high weirdness, though, only scratches

one of his many surfaces. For the full Hite experience, you need to sit across the table from him, as wild-eyed Argentinean waiters serve meat on swords (one of relatively few world cuisines with the serious ability to cause mortal wounds). You could also stay up late, late into the night talking politics, conspiracy theories, or just about anything else that comes to his mind (a phrase that encompasses much, when, Marvin-like, you realize he most likely has a brain the size of a planet).

In fact, perhaps the only hope for humanity is Ken's willingness – nay, glee – in killing off more than a few of these brain cells, along with his ever-suffering liver, on spectacular cocktails, like those served at London's Match Bar. Here, a few heady summers ago, James Wallis, Phil Masters, Ken and I spent a marvelous sum of money ordering far too many alcohol-based exotics, thoroughly enjoying loosing our wallets of what otherwise could have been called "rent" in a glorious bacchanal of epic proportions.

This stopped him not in becoming Nephilm Line Developer, editing various In Nomine books, writing Nightmares Of Mine for Iron Crown, The Cainite Heresy for Vampire: The Dark Ages, and other such endeavors, including the core book for Mage: The Sorcerers Crusade.

Ken co-designed the Origins-Award-winning Star Trek: The Next Generation RPG, scaled the dizzy heights of high-concept magical horror with GURPS Cabal, and saw his "Suppressed Transmission" column collected into not one but two books for Steve Jackson Games. That there's a market for such mind-blowing weirdness should scare us all. That that market is sated by one who's never met a Hawaiian shirt he didn't like makes it all just that much


more fuggly

That Ken can waft rhapsodic on Spring-Heeled Jack one moment, and the joys of the perfect Chicago-style hot dog the next should make you love him that much more. As should the fact that he's authored or contributed to well over 60 gaming books and supplements. The guy's charming, to boot (most of the best scoundrels are).

If you manage to pin him down, you may be lucky enough to discover he's also a rollicking storyteller.

Doing so over meat on a sword, or a really spectacular martini, will only heighten (if you'll pardon the phrase) the experience that is Ken Hite.

At the time there weren't many women in science I could look to as a role model, either. However, I still fondly recall my closest brush with the space program all these many years later. When I heard CONvergence planned to invite a scientist from the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, I jumped at the chance to serve as


guest liaison. When I learned that scientist was a woman, I was even more excited to meet her.

Bridget Landry is the rocket scientist who I'd consider my long-lost role model. In college Bridget studied chemistry and planetary science, going on to work on the Hubble Space Telescope, the oceanographic satellite Topex and the Mars Pathfinder project. Bridget is now continuing her work at JPL as a team member for the Cassini Mission to Saturn. Bridget's training as a scientist brings a different perspective to her work as an engineer. It's clear from her writings about her work that the thrill of scientific discovery is one of the highlights of her job.

But, in addition to her hard-science job, Bridget loves science fiction. She's been a fan since she was 13, and is an avid convention-goer. She's been a convention volunteer, panelist and speaker. Best of all, Bridget is an award-winning costumer, both in presentation and workmanship, with some notable pieces being Computer Pirates, the Strauss Waltz Assault Team (aka SWAT) and When Dominatrixes Go Good. Bridget's already agreed to be a judge at the Masquerade, and I'm looking forward to her reaction to this year's costume lineup.

Getting to know a little about Bridget has been anything but rocket science. In the short time I've been corresponding with her, Bridget has been genuine, friendly and open. I've already discovered more than a few common interests, besides our mutual love of space. I'm sure almost everyone will find something in common with this warm and talented woman.



However, Robert has played far, far more than just the beloved and hated, slightly mad leader of the Klingons.

For the last 30 years, he has been an actor and director at the Colony Theater in Los Angeles, where his directing has either won or been nominated for numerous awards. In 1989, he directed the world premier of Dennis Clontz's Generations which was cited by the American Theater Critics' Association as one of the best new plays produced outside of New York. He has also played the roles of Hamlet/Fortinbras in Charles Marowitz's interpretation of Hamlet and Edmund in King Lear in Los Angeles and performed in Broadway and off-Broadway productions in New York including Carnegie Hall.

In addition to his stage career, Robert has appeared in a vast number of television episodes and about ten movies, as well as lending his voice to several computer games. While Star Trek is what he is best known for (to those reading this anyway) I've enjoyed looking at the variety of roles he has had on many well known SF shows including The Incredible Hulk, Knight Rider, Max Headroom, The Adventures of Brisco County Jr. and The Flash. Though it isn't science fiction. I would also include his appearance on Cop Rock as being on a television show based in fantasy.

THE STORY OF AN ARTIST AS A MAD MAN.




Miles himself fled Salinas in 1983 for Los Angeles, where he attended the Art Center College of Design as an illustration major. He was lured away from school to become a concept illustrator for the film Legend and never went back. He worked in film for a while, then digressed from illustration to explore the world of sculpture, and ended up making robotic dinosaurs for museums. Seduced by the thought of Big Money, he also tried his hand at designing a computer game but his hopes and finances were cruelly dashed. Soldiering on, he found a true vocation in designing characters and special effects for film.

They say in true genius madness lies. If you look at this man's resume you can see the man is utterly barking mad and howling at the moon. Films like X3, Slither, King Kong, The Passion of the Christ, Pirates of the Caribbean, Galaxy

Quest, Men in Black, The Witches of Eastwick, and Robocop have his inimitable touch, and these are just a sampling of his work. He's currently working on multiple projects such as The Benjamin Button, an unusual epic love story featuring Brad Pitt and Cate Blanchett, and Marvel's Iron Man which is just starting production. His talented wife Malena Teves, an actress, model and singer in the band Lorraine a'Malena, may be the only thing keeping him mostly sane. I think we can all agree, however, that we need to keep Miles just a little bit on the edge. Our new favorite movies wouldn't be half as cool without his artistic stamp.






DAVID WEBER I

DAVID WEBER

Introduction by Anton Peterson



WHEN YOU THINK OF GREAT military science fiction authors one name springs immediately to mind. That name, of course, is CONvergence 2006 guest of honor David Weber.

When asked what is important in writing military science-fiction, a portion of the reply given by David Weber was "...sanitized military science fiction is in many respects the worst form of pornography: Military fiction in which people are hit by high-powered weapons and either die instantly and cleanly or suffer minor wounds, and only the characters that you didn't care a lot about were killed." He went on to elaborate that one way to impress upon others the vileness of war was to overload them with every splash of gore; the other, a more minimalist approach which hits the reader with an occasional gory incident, and good people can die.

David has spent considerable amounts of time on the study of military history, diplomacy, and political science. He has used this vast array of knowledge to create one of the best-known series in science fiction today. I don't believe I need to go on about how this series is compared to C.S. Forester's Horatio Hornblower series, or the compelling descriptions of space combat. If you have not already done so, you need to pick up the first book in the Honor Harrington universe called On Basilisk Station. After you have been sucked into the incredible story of Honor Harrington you can then enjoy the ten other novels, four collections, and two books that take place in the same universe. Once you have caught up then, like me, you just have to wait for the next one.

I like to spend my time waiting for the next book in the series by reading one of the other fantastic novels he has written. One of my favorites is the War God series that tells the story of Bahzell, a Horse Stealer Hradani. I think what appeals to me the most is Bahzell's complete and utter lack of interest in actually being a chosen one of the gods. It is a fantasy story about an unlikely and unwilling hero who thinks he is on the receiving end of the War gods sense of humor.

If a fantasy book doesn't strike your fancy right now, then maybe a collaboration series would interest you. There is the Starfire series written with Steve White and is based on the game of the same name. Or the popular Empire of Man series with John Ringo. One of the best choices might be to read 1633, his collaboration with Eric Flint. This is the sequel to 1632, which is about a small town in contemporary America being sent back to the year 1632, and all of the ramifications to our current history that entails. Eric, of course, is also a guest at CONvergence this year, and I am sure you can see the advantage of reading a book they wrote together. I am now starting to read one of his newer books called Bolo! This takes place in Keith Laumer's universe about gigantic robotic tanks with artificial intelligence. I look forward to reading his unique perspective on the universe of Bolo.

There are many other books not mentioned here that are well worth your picking up and reading. I hope that you all get a chance to say hello to David and his wife Sharon as they experience the wonderful convention known as CONvergence.

Anton Peterson is a long-time CONvergence volunteer, and has helped forge the CONvergence model of what a convention's guest liaison should be. I HAVEN'T MET GREG WEISMAN. Often, you do your part of the job without knowing who is going to follow you to do the remaining steps. It's like an assembly line, where the other people on the line often aren't in the same building as you, or even the same state. Why would anyone work in a crazy business like that? Ha. You assume we have a choice. How adorable.

I GREG WEISMAN I

Greg's no stranger to the world of comics. He's best known to comics fans for his run as the writer of Captain Atom for DC Comics in the late 1980's. Apparently, Greg thought he could flee from the singularity-like pull of comics by escaping into the glamorous life-in-the-fastlane world of television animation. Greg went to work in 1989 for Walt Disney Television Animation, rising through the ranks to become the Director of Series Development. It was in this capacity that Greg helped conceive his most famous creation: Disney's Gargoyles.

"I've been fascinated by gargoyles since at least my college days," says Greg. "But someone else at Disney made the suggestion to do a show about gargoyles. That's all they gave me. That one word. Gargoyles. I ran with it. Though I had a LOT of help. It was a real team effort."

The resulting series that debuted on October 24, 1994 was hailed for its complex story arcs and drama, a rarity in television animation of the time. *Gargoyles* quickly found itself popular with an older demographic and building a faithful, cult audience.

Greg acted as Supervising Producer and Supervising Story Editor of the first 66 episodes of Gargoyles, overseeing complex character arcs and stories meshed with medieval Scottish history. Despite all this success, a steady paycheck, and rubbing elbows with glamorous Hollywood types like Gargoyles voice actors Keith David, Jonathan Frakes and Marina Sirtis, Greg couldn't resist the siren call of comics completely.


I "worked with" Greg in 2000 to the extent that I had the pleasure of penciling a ten-page story that Greg wrote (not having any idea who would draw it). The story featured Captain Atom and other oddball members of DC's Justice League Europe team meeting a group of enchanted, rooftop-dwelling creatures that may or may not have borne a certain resemblance to characters from a certain Disney animated series.

But again, he thought he could escape.

Greg has worked as the story editor of season two of Disney's W.I.T.C.H., and has written for several recent animated series including Men in Black, Roughnecks: The Starship Troopers Chronicles, Max Steele, Buzz Lightyear of Star Command, and Kim Possible. Greg also wrote the two-part season one finale of The Batman, which featured the introduction of Clayface, heralded by many as the best and most character-driven story seen on that series to date.

But it wasn't enough. Oh no. Just when he thought he was out, they pulled him back IN!

Greg is writing the new ongoing Gargoyles comic from Slave Labor Graphics, the first issue of which came out in June. The comic book picks up where season two of the TV series left off, continuing the storylines of Goliath, Angela, Brooklyn and the other Gargoyles. "I'm tremendously excited—and vaguely terrified at the same time," Greg said. "I know a lot of people



have been waiting a long time for this[...] I've got ten years' worth of story ideas that I'm just dying to tell."

So I still haven't met Greg Weisman, although I look forward to changing that this weekend. I want to talk to him and learn if he's resigned to his fate now. He can work on other things from time to time, but comics never let you go. Maybe I can convince him that if he stops struggling it won't hurt at all.
